It's too *effing convenient* to leave it in a drawer. We must trade in the old iPhone, and buy the new iPhone, and then a year later buy the new *new new new iPhone*, without any goddamned iDea what the hell we're really doing. But ... See all the *wonders*

it can perform. And just how toxic is it anyway?

Some pregnant women living near a plant that supplied special minerals to the personal electronics industry have miscarried; some gave birth to children who were sickly, or mentally disabled, or blind.
